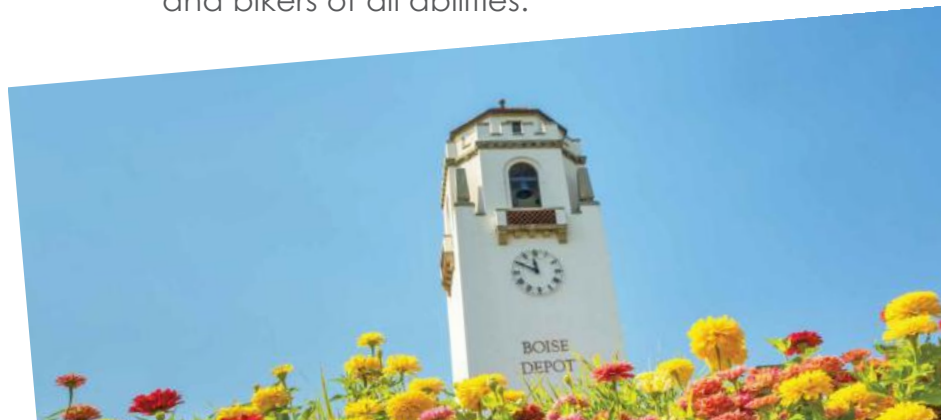

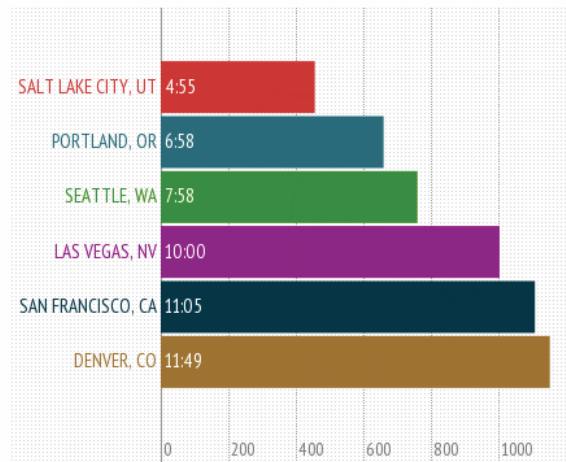


Location

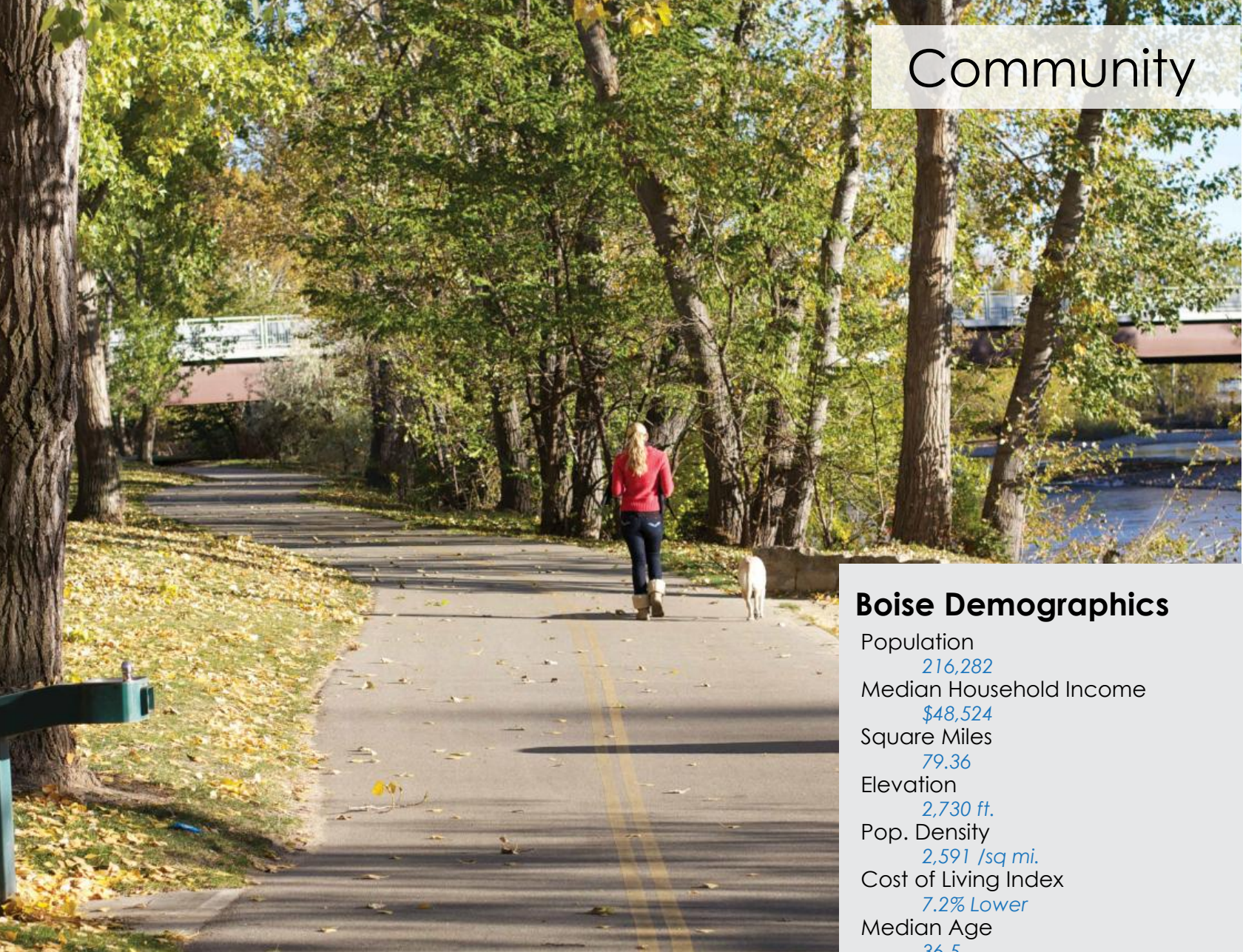

Boise has a semi-arid climate with four distinct seasons. Boise experiences hot and dry summers with highs reaching 100 °F eight days in a typical year and 90 °F on 51 days. Yet because of the aridity, average diurnal temperature variation exceeds 30 °F in summer. Winters are moderately cold, with a December average of 30.7 °F, and lows falling to 0 °F or below on around three nights per year. Snowfall averages 19 inches, but

typically falls in bouts of 3 inches or less. Spring and fall are mild. Autumn is brief; spring is gradual. Precipitation is usually infrequent and light, especially so during the summer months. Extremes have ranged from -28 °F on January 16, 1888 to 111 °F, as recently as July 19, 1960; temperatures have reached -25 °F and 110 °F as recently as December 22, 1990 and July 1, 2013, respectively.

Boise is the capital and most populous city in the state of Idaho, as well as the county seat of Ada County. Located on the Boise River in southwestern Idaho, the population of Boise at the 2010 Census was 205,671, the 99th largest in the nation.

The Boise City-Nampa metropolitan area includes five counties with a combined population of 616,500, the most populous metropolitan area in Idaho. It contains the state's three largest cities; Boise, Nampa, and Meridian. Boise is the third most populous metropolitan area in the United States' Pacific Northwest region, behind Seattle, and Portland.

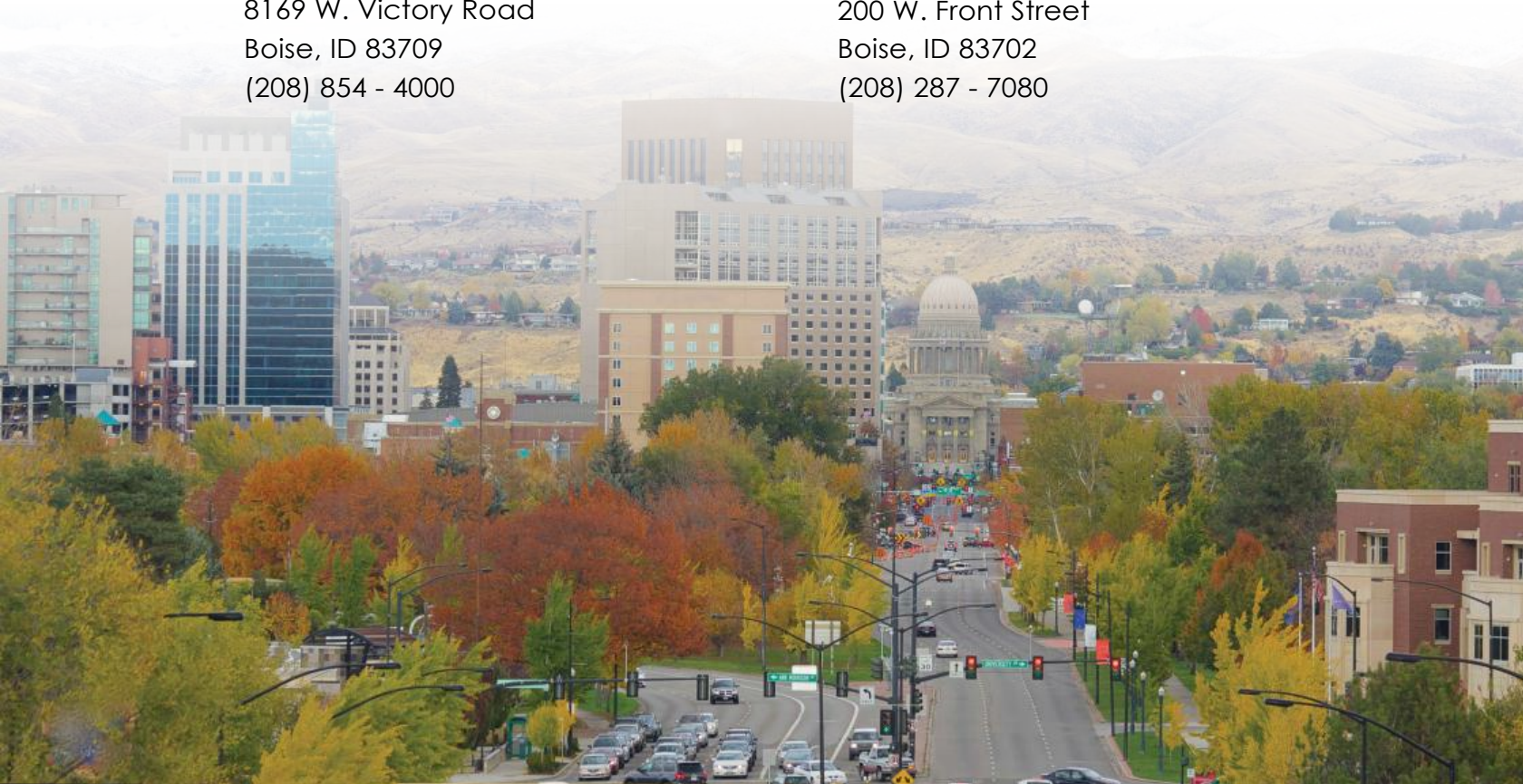

Boise History

Nestled on a high desert plain in the shadow of the Rocky Mountains with a pristine river flowing through its center, Boise finds its roots from the gold rush days of the 1800s. In 1834, Fort Boise, owned by the Hudson Bay Company, was established by British fur traders. The fort, now known as Old Fort Boise, was located at the mouth of the Boise River, 40 miles from present day Boise. In 1854, due to frequent Indian raids, the fort was abandoned. Despite this, the military desired to build another fort in the area, but, before this plan could go into effect, gold was discovered in the Boise Basin in 1862. It was now necessary, more than ever, to protect the vast number of travelers coming to the area.

On July 4, 1863, the military chose a location for the new Fort Boise and construction began soon afterward. A town site was located next to the fort, and with the protection of the military, the town grew quickly. A major reason for this growth, other than the gold rush, was its location along the Oregon Trail.

The Oregon Trail was a thoroughfare for thousands of travelers heading for the Oregon Territory. Of all the western roads, the Oregon Trail was the longest at 2,020 miles. It began in Independence, Missouri and ended at Oregon City, Oregon. Its route in Idaho began at the Idaho-Wyoming border, crossed through Bear Valley, turned north toward Fort Hall and then followed the Snake River until it reached the Boise River. It followed the south side of the river winding through what is now the southern part of Boise. To this day, wheel ruts can still be seen along some areas of its path.

Adding to this major thoroughfare were the routes to the Boise Basin and Owyhee mines. These routes crossed the Oregon Trail at the Fort Boise location. Because it was located at these major crossroads, Boise became a prosperous commercial center.

In 1864, when the territorial legislature held its second session in Lewiston, Boise was incorporated as a city and proclaimed the capital of the Idaho Territory. This same year, on July 26, the Idaho Statesman newspaper produced its first publication and became the second newspaper in Idaho.

Boise History (Continued)

The first was the Idaho World in Idaho City.

After the gold rush, Boise's population declined from 1,658 citizens in 1864 to 995 in 1870. With new construction, including the territorial prison in 1869 and the U.S. Assay Office in 1872, Boise began to grow again. The capitol building was completed in 1886 and in 1887, Boise built a streetcar system. In 1890, Idaho became a state.

In the early 1900s Boise once again enjoyed rapid growth. This growth came with the expansion of irrigation in the valley in 1902. This led to the construction of Arrowrock Dam, the tallest in the world from 1915 to 1932.

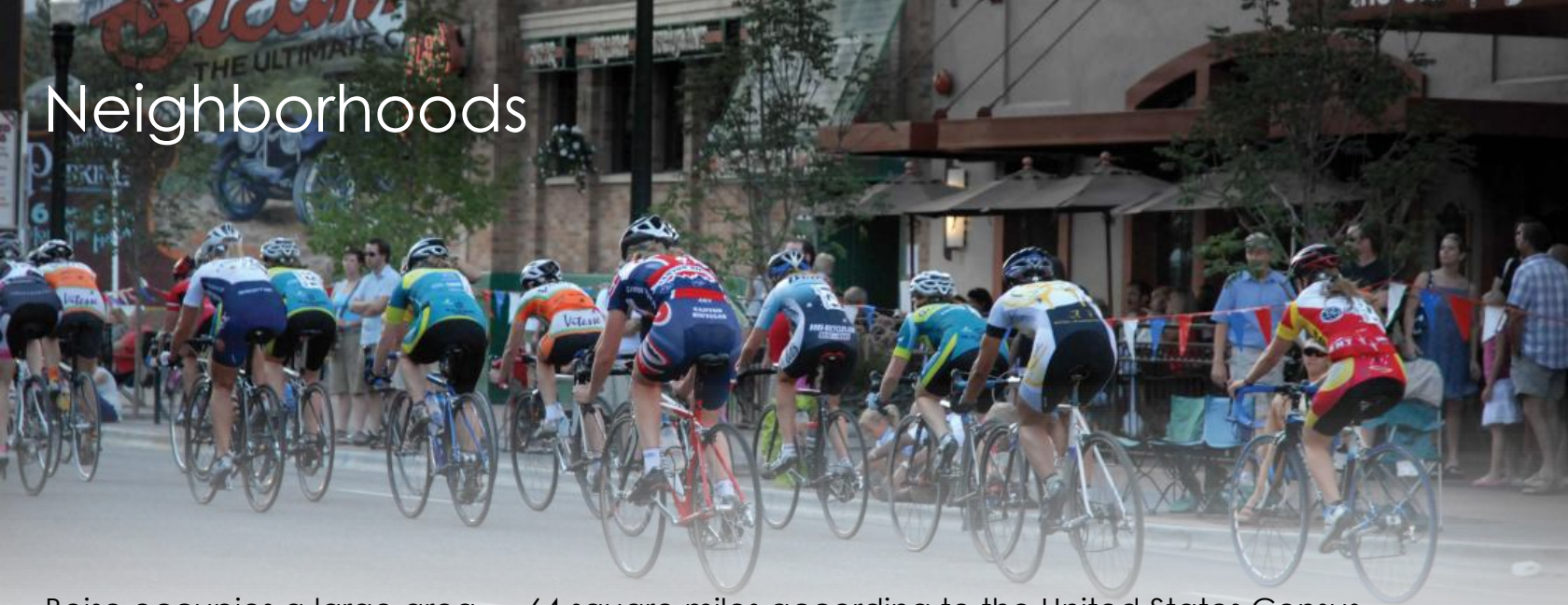
In the late 1930s, Boise was graced with the massive migration of Basques from their native home in the Western Pyrenees Mountains. These proud people became sheepherders, a large industry at the time, and gradually moved into the mainstream of city life in Boise, bringing their colorful culture with them. Today, Boise has the largest concentration of Basques per capita outside the Pyrenees Mountains.

As the Great Depression ravaged many cities in the nation, Boise enjoyed growth. And during World War II, multitudes of airmen trained at Gowen Field, Boise's air base.

Today, Boise is still the largest metropolitan community in the state with over 616,561 residents in the greater metropolitan area. Numerous international, national, regional and state corporations have their headquarters or a large presence in Boise. Some of these include Boise (formerly Boise Cascade), J.R. Simplot Company, Albertsons/SuperValu, Micron and URS Corporation's Washington Division. Boise is the hub of commerce, banking, and government for the state and is located midway between Salt Lake City, UT and Portland, OR.



Neighborhoods



Boise occupies a large area — 64 square miles according to the United States Census Bureau. Like all major cities, it is composed of several distinct neighborhoods.

Downtown Boise

Downtown Boise is the cultural center of the city and home to many small businesses as well as a few mid-rises. A variety of local restaurants abound featuring locally grown products, craft beverages, and seasonal menus. Community events such as the Saturday Farmer's Market, First Thursday, and Alive-After-Five outdoor concert series on the Grove bring large crowds to the area. The 8th Street Marketplace provides a quaint pedestrian zone lined with boutiques, local restaurants, and bars. Downtown Boise's popular attractions include Julia Davis, Ann Morrison & Catherine Albertson parks, the Idaho State Capitol, the classic Egyptian Theatre, the Boise Art Museum, and the Basque Block.

Boise State University

To the south of downtown is Boise State University, surrounded by residential neighborhoods & businesses catering to the student population. The area is dominated by residential neighborhoods and businesses catering to the student population. The unique blue playing field at the 37,000-seat Albertsons Stadium on the BSU campus, home to the Boise State Broncos football team, is a major city landmark. The university campus is home to the Taco Bell Arena, which hosts a variety of concert and sporting events, as well as the Morrison Center, which hosts the Idaho Ballet, Broadway shows and many other cultural performances.

The North End

The North End, generally defined as the part of Boise north of State Street, contains many of the city's older homes. It is known for its tree-lined drives such as Harrison Boulevard, and for its quiet neighborhoods near the downtown area. Bicyclists and pedestrians populate the shaded streets of the North End. Boutiques and popular eateries draw many to 13th Streets' Historic Hyde Park, situated below the outdoor enthusiast's much loved Camel's Back Park.

Neighborhoods (Continued)

Southwest Boise

Southwest Boise contains sparsely populated neighborhoods built from the 1960s to the early 1980s. Many include acre-sized plots and the occasional farmhouse and pasture. In the 1980s, growth in the area was stunted to prevent urban sprawl. Since this has been lifted, there has been widespread growth of new homes and neighborhoods. The area lies near Interstate 84, theaters, shopping, the airport, golf and the Boise Bench area.

Northwest Boise

Northwest Boise lies against the Boise Foothills to the north, State Street to the south, the city of Eagle to the west, and downtown Boise to the east. It contains a mix of old and new neighborhoods, including Lakeharbor, which features the private Silver Lake, a reclaimed quarry. Northwest Boise has some pockets of older homes with a similar aesthetic to the North End. Downtown is minutes away, as is Veteran's Memorial Park and easy access to the Boise Greenbelt.

East End

The East End is centered along the tree-lined avenue of Warm Springs and contains some of Boise's largest and most expensive homes (many of which were erected by wealthy miners and businessmen around the turn of the 20th century; Victorian styles feature prominently). Stretching up into the foothills, older and newer homes are available with spectacular views of the city. The East End hosts many attractions such as the Natatorium, Botanical Garden, Table Rock, M.K. Nature Center, Warm Springs Golf Course & the notable Old Idaho State Penitentiary.

Northeast Boise

As the demand for downtown living expands, so do the residential developments of Harris Ranch. Newly constructed homes nestled along the foothills and the Boise River offer quick access to downtown and many outdoor amenities. The Idaho Shakespeare Festival, the Boise Greenbelt, Ridge to Rivers Trails and Lucky Peak all highlight the area.



Neighborhoods (Continued)

Southeast Boise

Southeast Boise can be visualized as the area south of the Boise River and east of Federal Way. Barber Park, the official launch site for the longtime summer tradition of rafting the Boise River, is located within this area. Moving further Southeast from the city center reveals suburban style homes developed in the last thirty years. The planned communities in the area include Columbia Village, Oregon Trail Heights, and Surprise Valley. They were developed near the Simplot Sports complex which features over 20 fields, as well as a baseball complex, swimming pools, and a stunning view of the valley.

Boise Bench

The Bench, generally bounded by Federal Way to the east, Cole Road to the west and Garden City to the north, is named such because the sudden rise in elevation gives the prominent appearance of a step, or bench. A blend of 1950s brick bungalows, midcentury and grand homes permeate this locality. The cultural diversity of the area is reflected by the many ethnic specialty shops that offer an assortment of imports from around the globe. For those with a curious and cultivated palette, authentic ethnic food establishments thrive throughout the Bench. The Bench is home to the Boise Union Pacific Depot and older residential neighborhoods similar to those in the North End. Due south of the Bench is the Boise Airport.

West Boise

West Boise is home to the Boise Towne Square Mall, the largest in the state, as well as numerous restaurants, strip malls, and residential developments ranging from new subdivisions to apartment complexes. The West YMCA's recreational facility makes available a large array of healthy activities for both children and adults.

Meridian is located in Ada County, west of Boise. It is the 3rd largest city in the state of Idaho. The corporate headquarters of one of the area's major employers, Scentsy, is located in Meridian as well as Blue Cross of Idaho, Idaho State Police, and the state police academy.

Family entertainment overflows at the local water park, Roaring Springs. Sitting right next door is Wahooz, offering year-round go carts, bumper boats, miniature golf, batting cages, laser tag, bowling, an arcade and grill. The Meridian Speedway is another fun summer attraction for the city.

The Village at Meridian is an outdoor shopping mall featuring specialty retail stores, restaurants, an upscale movie theater with private seating, a fitness center, arcade/bowling, and an outdoor ice rink (winter). Relax in the ample outdoor seating, run through the playground or gather around the fountain showcasing

water displays every hour with lights and music. Throughout the city lies 17 public parks including Settlers Park, which hosts free outdoor movies during the summer months.

The Meridian Youth Farmers Market is held at the city hall plaza on Saturdays, 9am-12pm, from the end of June – end of September. The market offers locally grown produce, homemade goodies and handmade arts and crafts.

Sitting below the surrounding Owyhee, Weiser and Boise mountain ranges is the City of Caldwell. Recreational activities are a highlight of Idaho and the Caldwell area provides access to a variety of enthusiasts from rock hounds to river rafters, skiers to hot springs lovers, trail riders to hikers and much, much more.

Caldwell, 25 miles west of Boise, is the second largest city in Canyon County. The premier event in Caldwell is the Caldwell Night Rodeo, "Where the Cowboys are the Stars," a western tradition that is held in August.

Caldwell has been recognized as "the heart of Idaho wine country" with a variety of wineries to tour located in the nearby countryside. Many enjoy the summer

concert series hosted each year by Ste. Chapelle Winery.

Caldwell hosts a variety of events through the year. Take part in the biggest Cinco de Mayo celebration in the Treasure Valley, peruse the Wednesday evening Farmers Market from May – October and join in the Indian Creek Festival, a two-day community event chock-full of activities from the Fireman's Breakfast to the kayak race to the Wagons Ho Chuck Wagon experience and more! Residents and visitors alike also appreciate great golf at the Purple Sage or Fairview Golf courses.

Get Out & PLAY

Boise may just be the most outdoor-oriented city in the United States. Residents and visitors alike rave about the city's river, foothills and bike paths — after all, they're not just near Boise, they're right in Boise. From relaxing walks and rides along the city's 25-mile long riverfront Greenbelt to bombing down a thrilling single-track at dusk, it's easy to fill your day with outdoor play.

For those who love the great outdoors, the challenge becomes fitting it all in. Even on a short visit to Boise, it's easy to squeeze in a paddle, ride, hike and blue-ribbon trout fishing without leaving the city limits.

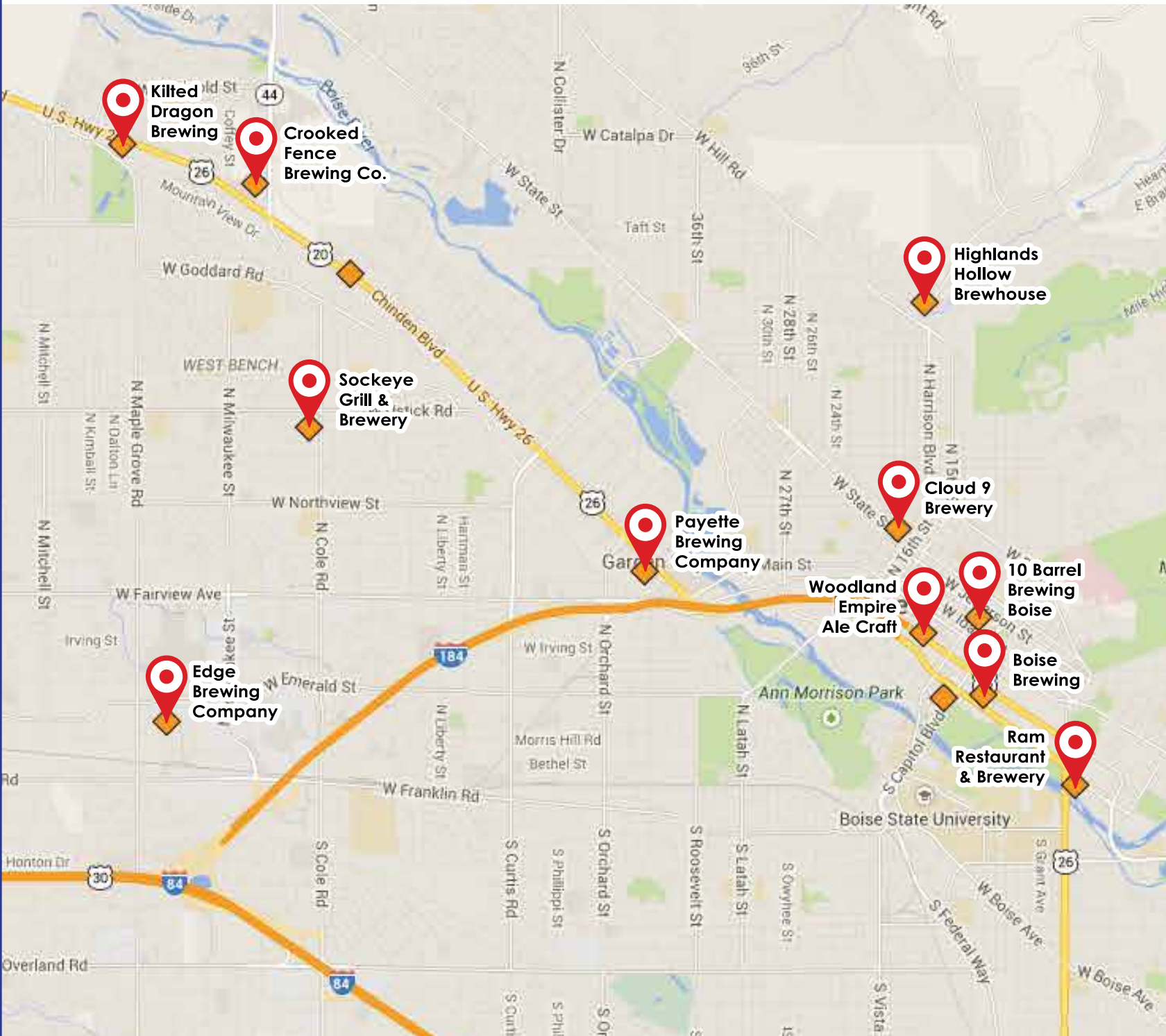

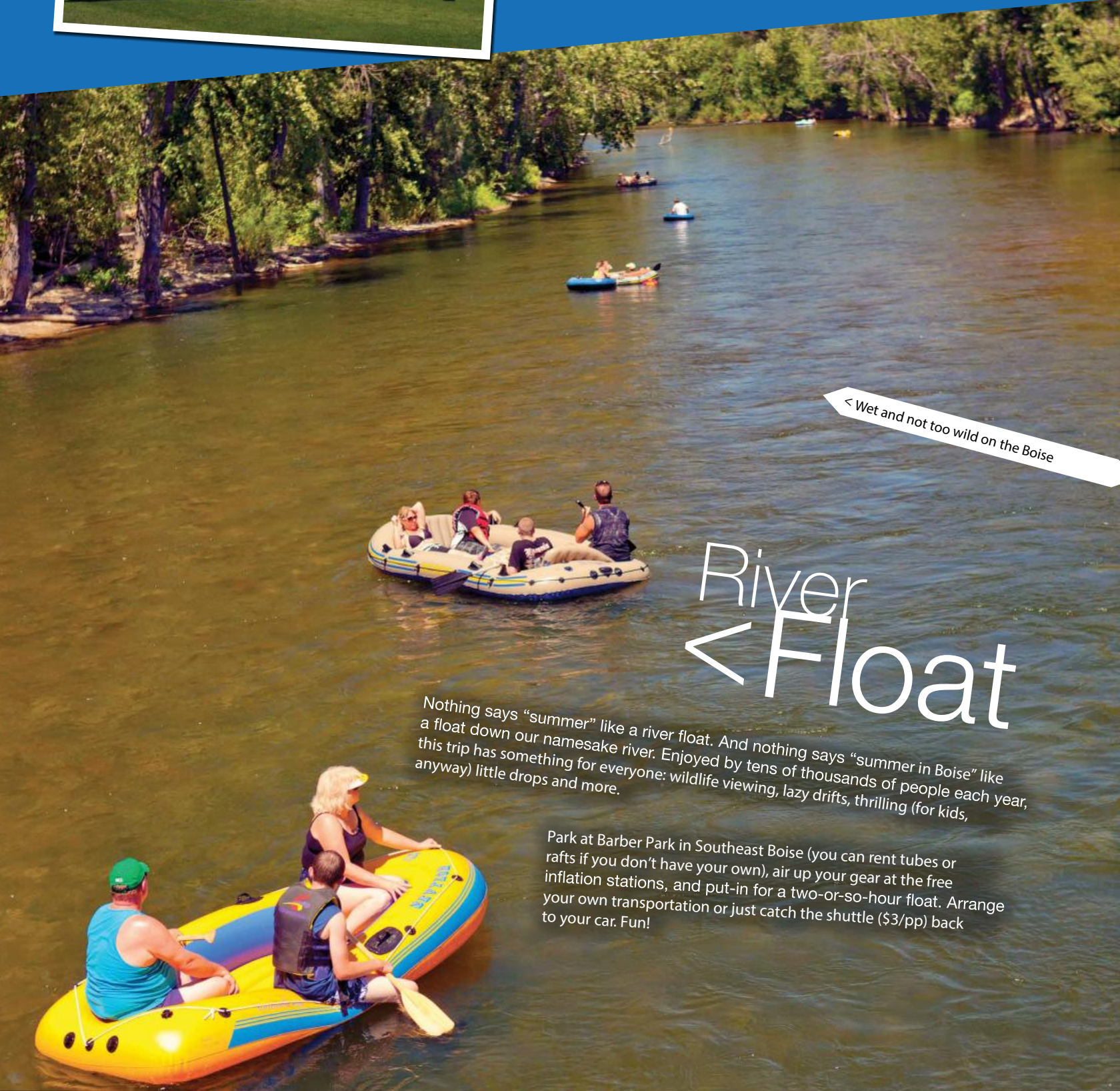
